


#### Introduction

The *Enabling Hearts Discussion Guide* is a guide for churches to facilitate disability ministry team discussions on the contents of KIN's disability ministry primer, *Enabling Hearts: A Primer for Disability-Inclusive Churches*.

Through such small group discussions, the following can be achieved:

- 1.A deeper understanding about the theology of disability and how disability ministry can be undertaken, and
- 2.A greater alignment among discussion group members to empower teamwork and unity.

This guide is primarily targeted at disability ministry leaders and volunteers, as well as church leaders.



# How to use this Guide

Each member of the discussion group should obtain a copy of **Enabling Hearts** (available directly from KIN<sup>1</sup> or from Graceworks<sup>2</sup>).

The discussion should be completed over 5 to 7 sessions.

Sessions 1–5 should be considered compulsory.

Sessions 6–7 are optional and may be skipped if time is tight, though it would be ideal if the group could complete these sessions as well.

All members should be informed in advance of the book chapters for discussion, and read them prior to each session. It is suggested that each session comprises:


An opening prayer

# Enabling Hearts: Chapter 1

- Disability is a result of society, not just the individual.
- We must address unhealthy myths about disability.
- There are several reasons for including people with disabilities, one of them being that they are gifted by the Holy Spirit to be disciples and disciplemakers.

How does the Bible address them?

"A Church that is truly disabled is one that excludes people with disabilities." (p. 10)


Draw an image that you think best represents an inclusive church.

- It comprises development at the level of the self, team, church, and beyond.


1	How can you prepare yourself for growth as an individual? (Step 1)
2	How can prayer be a key element of your ministry team's life? (Step 2)
3	Review the disability ministry team that you currently serve in.  Is it sufficiently diverse? (Step 3)

Think of what steps you can take to better understand your congregation and the community that surrounds your church. (Steps 4–5)



# Enabling Hearts: Chapter 4

- Neurodevelopmental disabilities are common in Singapore.
- There are many misconceptions and myths surrounding such disabilities.
- Churches need to actively find ways to educate their congregations about such disabilities.

The disabilities listed in this chapter are "invisible" disabilities.

Why are such "invisible" disabilities more likely to be misunderstood by members of the congregation, compared to "visible" disabilities?

What are practical ways that your disability ministry can adopt to raise awareness of such "invisible" disabilities?


Find out which disabilities are most common in your church.

Note: If needed, KIN can help a church's disability ministry team undertake a study to better understand their congregation/s and their church's context.

Invite a person with an "invisible" disability (ideally one with lower support needs) to dialogue with your disability ministry team.

If such a person is not available, consider dialoguing with a caregiver to a person with an invisible disability.

# Discipleship



# Enabling Hearts: Chapter 9

- Discipleship is the relationship between God and believers it is both individual and corporate.
- Discipleship is about following after Jesus, not just the accumulation of facts and knowledge.
- The Church needs to reconsider how its practices are lived out so that people with disabilities can be included in discipleship.

Do you believe that people with disabilities can be disciple makers, in addition to being disciples?

Which individuals in the Bible or in church history have disabilities but are also disciple makers?

How might the discipleship of people with disabilities look like?

How can your disability ministry make discipleship a core part of its work?


Discuss which discipleship gap is most applicable for persons with disabilities in your congregation.

Brainstorm a list of ways that might help to fill this gap.

Discuss whether there are areas of your church's culture and practice that might be hindering the discipleship of people with disabilities.

How might you address these areas?

# Choose relevant chapters from *Enabling Hearts*: Chapters 11-17

- Understanding the nature of a person's disability and its cultural context is key to inclusion.
- Inclusion is not just letting people with disabilities be present, but giving them a community where they can flourish as disciples and disciplemakers.

What are some stereotypes about the disabilities which you have read about? Do you think others in the congregation might hold such stereotypes too?

How can your ministry help to address such stereotypes?

Based on your reading, what are some concrete strategies your ministry could adopt that might be relevant to people with specific disabilities in your congregation?

Identify some concrete ways for your team to learn more about these specific disabilities.

Arrange to visit a ministry to persons with these specific disabilities (either Christian or not) in order to get a fuller personal experience of such individuals.

(The Action Items from Session 4 could also be considered for Session 6.)
